Scott Layer drove the length of the court and hit a lean-in jumper with five seconds left to advance Lehigh to the semi-finals. Senior Peter Rudman came off the bench to score a career-high 18 points including three 3-pointers while Bob Krizansky led the Engineer's with 21 points, Tom Martin added 13. For the game Lehigh shot 57.4% including 6-12 from three-point range.

Towson 73 Lehigh 60 - ECC Championship - Mar. 6, 1990 - Towson, Md.

Despite 23 points from Dozie Mbonu and 12 from Bob Krizansky, Lehigh fell short in its bid for a third ECC championship. Towson led by only one point at halftime, 33-32, but outscored the Engineers 15-5 midway through the second half to gain the victory. Lehigh placed three players on the All-Tournament Team, Bob Krizansky, Dozie Mbonu and Scott Layer. Kurk Lee was named tournament MVP, scoring 22 vs. the Engineers. This was Lehigh's third championship game appearance in six years.

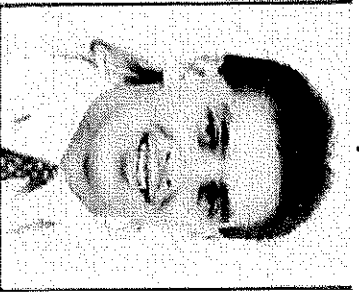

Lehigh also claimed the men's version of the Lehigh-Lafayette all-sports trophy for the 19th time in 26 years. The deciding point in the 7-6 final score came with the golf team's win over the Leopards in the Lehigh Valley Collegiate Tournament. The Lafayette women won their competition 5.5 to 4.5.

Men's competition began in 1966-67 and Lehigh has won the trophy 16 times with Lafayette claiming the title just once while there have been six ties. The Engineer men have won the last three years in a row.

One for the future

Head coach Sue Troyan and her Lehigh softball squad certainly weren't in any mood for hearing it at the time, but the Engineers were recipients of high praise even after finishing third in the 1992 Patriot League championship tournament.

"There's no doubt about it — Lehigh is the team of the future in this league," said Army mentor Jim Flowers, whose Cadets won the tournament crown. "They ended the season peaking, and we felt coming in that (Lehigh) would be the team to beat."

Few people expected the Lehigh softball team to be classified "the team to beat" in 1992 — maybe not even the Engineers themselves.

Lehigh entered 1992 with seven freshmen and a 10-25 record from the previous season. No one was certain what the new season would hold.

The Engineers started out slowly, going 3-7 on their annual spring training trip. But the Engineers won five of their first six games after returning north and thus started an upward trend that climaxed with a seven-game win streak and the school-record 19th win of the season.

Second-seeded Lehigh opened the league tournament with 11-2 and 6-5 wins over Holy Cross and Lafayette, respectively, setting up a showdown between the tournament's top seeds. Lehigh took a 5-4 lead in the fourth inning, but Army answered with four runs in the bottom of the inning and held on for a 10-5 win. Lehigh then fell 10-3 to Colgate, a team the Engineers split a pair of games with in the regular season, to finish 2-2 on the weekend.

Perhaps more importantly, though, Lehigh won 21 times in 1992, improving on the school record by three games. The Engineers also finished fifth in the nation in scoring at 5.83 runs per game and 11th nationally in batting with a .307 team average. In all, six Engineer starters batted above .300 after not one accomplished that mark in 1991.
