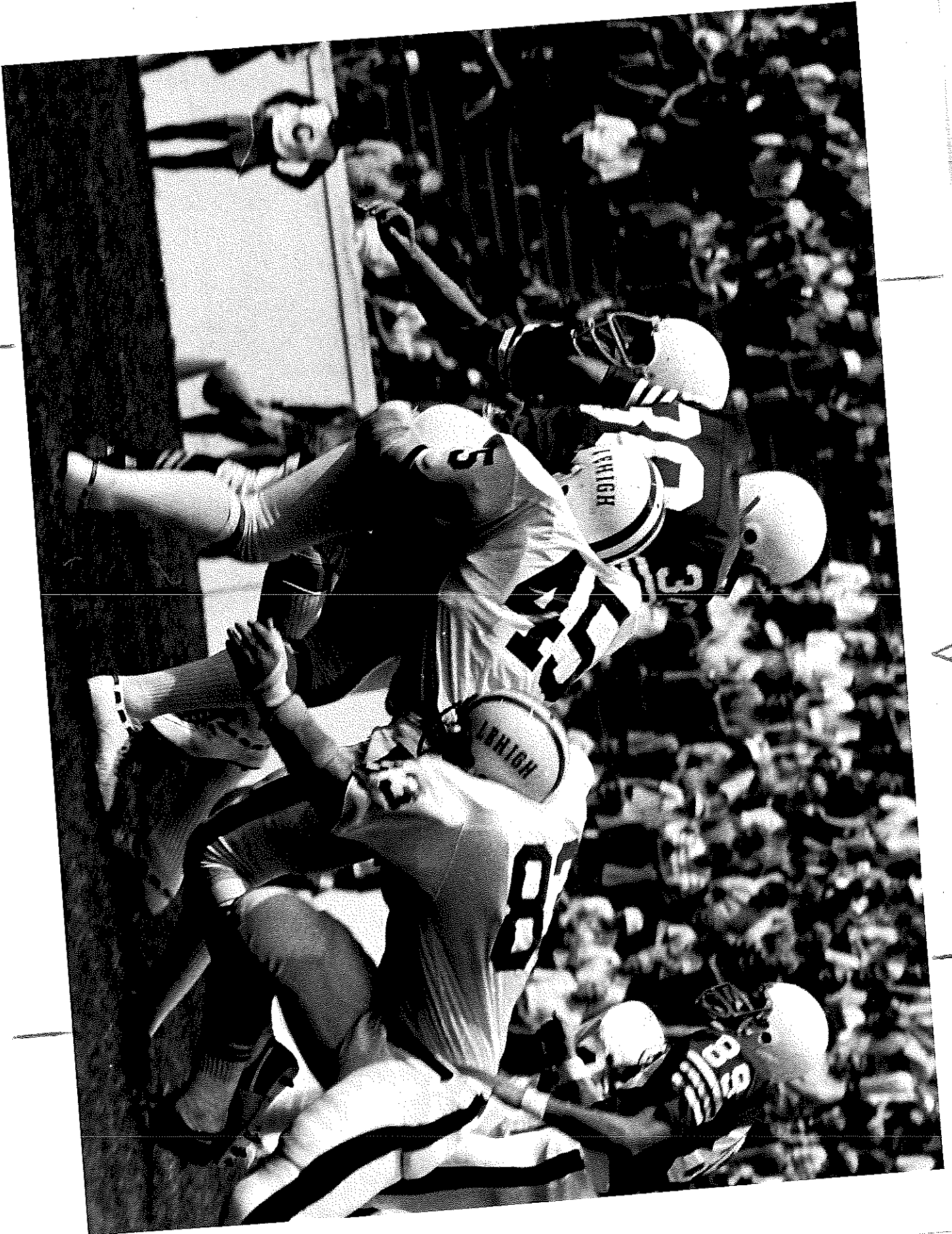

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LEHIGH TO HONOR '77 NATIONAL CHAMPS 10 YEARS AGO LEHIGH'S DIVISION II NATIONAL CHAMPS OF '77 TO BE HONORED AT TAYLOR STADIUM TOMORROW

Mike Rieker and Greg Clark spent a lot of time this week looking at films of Lehigh football

This time, though, they weren't preparing for an upcoming opponent, as they had so often. This time they were splicing, editing and dubbing in background music . . . they were making a memory.

Rieker and Clark were working on a highlight film of the 1977 Lehigh football season - the year the Engineers won the NCAA Division II national championship.

The Engineer cocaptains undoubtedly have starring roles in their film, which will be shown to many of their former teammates this weekend. Many of the '77 team members will be in town to be honored tomorrow at halftime of the Lehigh-Brown game at Taylor Stadium.

The '77 championship team will be saluted along with the undefeated team of 1950; the 1980 club that went undefeated in the regular season and won the Lambert Cup, and the Lambert Cup winners of 1957, '61, '73 and '75.

Also, John Whitehead, Lehigh's head coach from 1976-85, will be inducted into the Lehigh Valley Football Hall of Fame during the halftime ceremony.

The '77 team had planned a 10th year reunion dinner for this weekend even before they were asked to participate in the salute to Lehigh's greatest teams; but the chance to walk on the Taylor Stadium turf one more time figures to make the get-together all the more memorable.

"Things worked out just perfect," said Clark, a hard-nosed defensive end on the '77 squad. "I know a lot of memories will come back to all of us when we walk back onto the field. I'm glad we were able to get together one more time before they move to the new stadium."

Undoubtedly, plenty of memories will come to life over the weekend . . . great plays, bad plays, halftime speeches and pregame parties.

Pregame parties? Yes, the '77 team would never be mistaken for a group of choir boys, according to Rieker.

"Yeah, I'd say we had a loose, fun-loving group; we were like one big, happy family, " recalled the squad's quarterback. "We got into our share of trouble. But when it came down to business, we went to work and got the job done."

Rieker recalls that a national championship was the furthest thing from everybody's mind when the season began. After reaching the Division II tournament in 1975, the Engineers fell to 6-5 in 1976.

"We went into the season just wanting to improve on the 6-5 record from the season before," said Rieker. "Of course, we wanted to make sure we beat Lafayette and won as many games as possible. But thoughts of making the playoffs were just about forgotten when we got beat by Baldwin-Wallace, a Division 3 school, in the second game of the season and then got drubbed by Rutgers."

It was the Baldwin-Wallace loss that Clark recalled more vividly.

"That was a very long 11-hour bus ride back from that one," he remembered. "It was a quiet trip home, giving us plenty of time to ponder what went wrong. It seemed at the time to be a devastating loss. Losing to any Division 3 team was not something we liked very much."

The loss to Rutgers four weeks later dropped Lehigh to 4-2, but then the Engineers put it all together in a four-game winning streak that put them back into playoff contention heading into the regular-season finale against Lafayette.

Lehigh never needs any extra incentive against the Leopards, but they had some this time - a win would put them into the Division II playoffs as the No. 8 seed.

"When Mike and I were sophomores, the team made the playoffs, but they were not hungry for it," recalled Clark. "Some of the guys didn't even want to play in the playoffs initially because they were worried about their college boards. But in '77, everybody was hungry for the playoffs."

Their appetite was satisfied as Lehigh rallied from an early second-half deficit of 17-14 to blow away the Leopards 35-17. The team was playoff-bound.

The toughest test in the postseason came immediately when Lehigh edged a highly-touted Massachusetts team 30-23 at UMass. From there, the team grew more confident and just wanted to, in Clark's words, "keep the ball rolling."

Roll they did. Lehigh whipped Cal-Davis in the Knute Rockne Bowl played in Davis, Calif., 39-30 and then crunched Jacksonville State 33-0 in the Pioneer Bowl for the Division II crown in Wichita Falls, Tex.

Rieker and Clark ended their collegiate careers in fitting fashion. Rieker threw a pair of TD passes - both to junior Steve Kreider, who would go on to a nine-year career with Cincinnati in the NFL - and rushed for another, while Clark earned defensive player of the game honors by recovering two fumbles and forcing another one.

Rieker's lasting impression of the afternoon of Dec. 10, 1977, the day the Engineer football team made all of Bethlehem and the Lehigh Valley proud, was of seeing his parents just after the game was over.

"That was the biggest thrill for me, seeing the smiles on their faces, the joy it gave them," he said. "It gave me a great feeling to know that I had made them proud of me. My dad (Carl) worked at the Bethlehem Steel, which was big Lehigh country. The joy I had given him and my mom made me feel great after all the grief I had given them over the years."

Both Rieker and Clark have families of their own now. Each has a son.

Rieker has remained in his home town of Catasauqua and is a member of the Catty School Board. He also works as a territory manager at Baxter Health Corp. and does the color commentary with John Daday on Service Electric Cable broadcasts of Lehigh home games.

Clark, who is originally from Rochester, N.Y., married a Lehigh Valley girl and is building a home in Lower Nazareth Township. He works as a manufacturing manager at the Follett Corporation.

Both follow the present fortunes of the Lehigh football program and are saddened to see the current downward trend that has seen the team post 5-6 records the past three years. The '87 Brown and White squad owns a 4-4 mark at the moment.

"It gets me a little down to see the current slump Lehigh teams are going through . . . a little sad to see something you helped build fall apart. But I'm sure they're going to bounce back."

Rieker thinks Lehigh's involvement with the Colonial League, which doesn't allow its teams to participate in the Division I-AA playoffs, is a mistake.

"It was those playoff games and the national television exposure we got from ABC-TV that helped Steve Kreider and myself get a look from NFL teams," he said. "Steve made it big, while I got drafted by New Orleans and had shots with several NFL teams. That probably would have never happened if we had been in the Colonial League back then and weren't able to play in the playoffs."

Rieker said that since his hopes of an NFL career ended with an injury several years ago, he's spent more time reflecting on his years at Lehigh.

He, like Clark, recalls the times Whitehead made life miserable for them by screaming at them when they made a mistake.

Clark says Whitehead was "a tough coach, who you loved to hate at the time, but later realized what a great coach he was and how he made you a better player."

Rieker recalled that "You had to do things his way and he wasn't the type who patted a lot of people on the back. A lot of the guys were afraid of him - I wasn't."

"When he yelled and screamed - and I got it more than any other player - I just listened. He corrected a lot of my flaws and made me a better football player. I realize now all he did for me and personally, I love the guy now."

Rieker and Clark also love to recall all the details of that '77 season. The memories will never fade.

"We consider ourselves to be an elite group among Lehigh alumni. We were the only team to win a national championship; and because of the Colonial League, we'll probably go down as the only team to win a national championship.

"It's something we're proud of and we'll still be happy to talk about 40 years from now when we're celebrating our 50th reunion."

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
